JUDGE LYNN

The Judge Lynn Chapter was organized February 22, 1908 by the Regent, Mrs. Bertha M. Robbins. Mrs. Donald McLean, President General, honored the new chapter by giving it the name of her revolutionary ancestor, Judge David Lynn, who was one of the Twelve Immortal Judges of Maryland.

Judge Lynn held his commission under King George of England and was one of the twelve judges who, on November 23, 1765, decided that before the English Stamp Act would be recognized by the Maryland Courts, the Courts must be officially notified of the passage of that Act. In memory of this courageous stand, said to be one of the first of the various actions against England which resulted in the revolt of the Colonists, a large bronze tablet was erected in the Courthouse at Frederick, Maryland by the DAR in 1904.

DAR projects to preserve our cultural heritage:

- Restoring and maintaining historical sites.
- Locating, restoring and marking Revolutionary War patriot grave sites and headstones.
- Organizing and contributing to restorations, commemorations and memorials.
- Placing monuments around the world.
- Preserving genealogical records, artifacts and historical documents.

PRESERVATION

From 1791 to 1792 Andrew Ellicott created the perimeter of the District of Columbia through the placement of 40 uniquely marked boundary stones. The DC DAR preserves the remaining stones - 14 in Virginia and 26 along the Maryland/DC border - and created public awareness of their importance.
